

Frequently Asked Questions

What courses do I need to complete in order to graduate?

Students must complete 20 credits in order to be eligible to graduate. This includes **15.0 core credits, 3.0 specialization credits (Community and Justice Services CJS, or Police Foundations POL) and 2.0 General Elective credits.**

Students are required to choose their specialization after their first year of studies. Each course in the Justice Studies program has a credit value of 0.5, unless otherwise noted.

What General Electives should I take?

Choose electives that interest you. Electives offered in the fall will differ from electives offered in the winter semester. A schedule will be available before course selection entitled 'Electives'. If you are interested in applying to post-graduate program(s) after graduation, you may wish to tailor your electives to meet the admission requirements of various programs.

Can I take a Justice Studies course as an elective?

No. General Electives are designed to give students depth and breadth in their studies and provide an opportunity for Justice Studies students to take courses with University of Guelph-Humber students in other programs.

Am I required to take my electives at Guelph-Humber?

Letters of Permission may be available in order for you to take your General Electives at another university. Please see your Academic Advisor for further information.

Is there workplace experience integrated in the Justice Studies Program?

Yes. Students will complete community service placements in second and third year. **Both placements total 200 hours (100 hours each placement).** Justice Studies students will develop sensitivity to contemporary social issues ranging from abuse and violence to welfare. Throughout their placements, students participate in weekly seminars to critically analyze their volunteer experiences.

I am a transfer student. How do I know which courses to select?

Transfer Students should use this document in collaboration with their *Official Transfer Credit Assessment* to determine which courses they have been granted and which courses they need to register for. Transfer students should meet with their Academic Advisor to confirm the schedule they have developed in advance of the course selection dates.
