

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT THE JUSTICE STUDIES PROGRAM

What courses do I need to complete in order to graduate?

You must complete 20 credits over 4 years of study, including 2 General Elective credits and 3 Specialization credits (Community and Justice Services **CJS**, or Police Foundations **POL**). Students are required to choose their specialization after their first year of studies.

What electives should I take?

Choose your electives in the subjects that interest you the most. Different electives are offered in different semesters and these will be noted in time for course selection.

Can I take a Justice Studies course as an elective?

No. Electives are designed to give students breadth in their studies and provide an opportunity for Justice Studies students to take courses with GH students in other programs.

Am I required to take my electives at Guelph-Humber?

Letters of Permission may be available in order for you to take your electives at another institution. Please see your Program Advisor or direct inquiries to Learning Support Peers.

Is there Field Placement in the Justice Studies Program?

Yes. Through community service placements in second and third year, Justice Studies students will develop sensitivity to contemporary social issues ranging from abuse and violence to welfare. Throughout their placements, students participate in weekly seminars to critically analyze their volunteer experiences.

I am a transfer student. How do I know which courses to select?

Transfer Students should use this document in collaboration with their official credit assessment to determine which courses they have the required pre-requisites to select. Transfer students should meet with their Program Advisor to confirm the schedule they have developed in advance of the course selection dates.
